# AWARDS

Ribbons and premium money will be awarded as follows:

**BLUE** will be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit, with a prize of \$7.

**RED** will be awarded to the second highest scoring exhibit, with a prize of \$5.

WHITE will be awarded to the third highest scoring exhibit, with a prize of \$2.

**SPECIAL AWARDS** will be awarded to superior exhibits from the Blue-ribbon group at the discretion of the judges. This ribbon includes a prize of \$15.

SWEEPSTAKES AWARDS will be awarded to superior exhibits from the SPECIAL awards group at the discretion of the judges. This ribbon includes a prize of \$25; only one is awarded per department age group.

**DEPARTMENT BEST OF SHOW** - \$50.00 and Ribbon for "Best of Show" in each Department across all age groups.

## **OTHER AWARDS**

There are department-specific awards, which are listed in each department's section. Superior articles may receive special recognition when recommended by the Department Superintendent and approved by the General Superintendent.

Best of show winners will have their name displayed on a permanent plaque in the Home Arts building.

# ELKO COUNTY FAIR GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

## **GENERAL FAIR REGULATIONS**

- L The Grounds Manager and Fair Board Members will be on the grounds during the Fair and the entire supervision of the grounds will be vested in them. Supervision of the racetrack will be vested in the Board of Stewards.
- L The sale of all tickets will be vested in the Admissions Superintendent, or an assistant the Superintendent may appoint.
- The Elko County Fair, its Boards, its employees, its agents, and its volunteers will not be responsible for accidents or losses which may occur from any cause whatsoever.
- Any exhibitor, whether commercial or otherwise, exhibits at the sole discretion and only with the express written permission of the Elko County Fair Board. Any unauthorized exhibits will be removed immediately. The Fair Board reserves the right to remove any exhibit which, in its sole judgement, is inappropriate to display at the Fair.
- All concessionaires and special exhibitors must secure a permit and contract from the Elko County Fair Board and shall occupy such booth or grounds as assigned. Any health permits needed are the exhibitors' responsibility. All sales are subject to Nevada sales tax.
- I The Elko County Fair Board reserves the right to refuse admission to or remove any person who, in the Board's judgement, is detrimental to the health, safety or enjoyment of other Fairgoers.

## HOME ARTS GENERAL RULES

- All exhibits entered in the competition must be the work of the exhibitor, completed in the last two years, and not previously entered in the Elko County Fair. Persons entering exhibits for others must state that when registering, and the exhibits must be entered under the creator's name. Any prize money won belongs to the creator of the exhibit.
- All articles will be subject to approval by the General or Department Superintendent before entry. The Home Arts Committee reserves the right to reject any entry.
- All exhibits must be in good condition and must meet the regulations outlined in this Premium List.
- All exhibits must be properly labeled and prepared according to the rules for each department.
- L Exhibits may be moved between departments at the discretion of the superintendents. Exhibits not adhering to department rules may be rejected or judged less favorably.
- Ribbons & cards must remain attached to exhibits while on display. PLEASE DO NOT TOUCH THE EXHIBITS.
- Parents with young children are asked to hold their children's hands while touring the Exhibit Buildings.
- If you wish to sell your exhibit, ask a volunteer to help you put a "for sale" sign with the price and your phone number on it AFTER exhibits open to the public.
- Elko County Fair is not responsible for loss or damage.
- Any person showing disrespect to any Fair volunteer or personnel forfeits all awards

made to them and may be asked to leave the premises.

- I Judges are instructed not to award premiums unless exhibits are deemed worthy of those awards. Judges may award any premium, or none, according to their judgment. All judges' decisions are final.
- Once doors are closed for judging, no exhibitors will be allowed in the exhibit building. No entries will be accepted in a department after judging has begun. Please refer to the schedule for entry times.
- C These rules apply to all Home Arts departments. In addition, each department has rules and judging standards specific to it. Exhibitors should read, understand, and adhere to those rules as well.
- Age divisions are as follows: ADULT – 18 years of age and over JUNIOR – 14-17 years of age YOUTH – 9-13 years of age CHILD – 8 years of age and under



## HOW TO ENTER A HOME ARTS EXHIBIT

- Any Nevada resident can enter an exhibit for judging in the Home Arts competitions. Professionals (teachers, those who sell their work, department judges etc) must enter in the "Professional Class" for the relevant department.
- Read this premium List carefully and determine which Department(s) and Class(s) are of interest to you. Understand the rules and judging standards for Home Arts overall, and for each department you're considering entering. Be sure and keep this Premium List as you will need to refer to it before the Fair.
- U When you prepare your exhibit for entry, be certain that it is ready to be displayed based on the rules for each individual department.
- Please either enter online or at the registration table and pick up your entry tags before bringing your entries to department superintendents. If you're not entering online, please check in on Wednesday or before 10 am on Thursday.
- L Bring your exhibit(s) to the Goicoechea Home Arts Building on the designated registration days and times. Entries will not be accepted after the closing time for that department. Each exhibitor will be asked to pay a \$7.00 entry fee.
- All exhibits MUST be checked in by 12 PM Thursday (5:00 PM Thursday for Baking, Flowers and Plants ONLY), as judging will begin immediately afterwards. No exhibits will be accepted after the cutoff time.
- Home Arts will re-open to the public Friday afternoon, August 30<sup>th</sup>, at 1:00 PM.
   All contestants can see the results of the judging at that time.
- All entries in Home Arts must remain on display until Monday Sept 2<sup>nd</sup> at 9:00 AM.

Exhibitors removing their entries before that time will forfeit all premium money they have won. Exhibits must be removed before 6:00 PM Monday September 2<sup>nd</sup>. Bring your entry receipt to claim your exhibits.

Premium money is paid out Monday from 9AM - 6PM. Any premium money not collected by 6PM Monday will be returned to the fair as a donation. You must bring your entry receipt(s) in order to collect your premium money. Premium money is paid on exhibits as shown and awarded in the Judges' report.



#### Cut the lines with Online Entries!!

We're making it easier for busy would-be Fair exhibitors to enter the Home Arts competitions! Save yourself a lot of time on entry day by pre-entering your exhibits online. Go to the Fair's website. www.elkocountyfair.com, and click on "How to Enter" link, and follow the instructions. It's that easy! You can go back at any time to add or delete entries up until 12:00 midnight, Wednesday, August 28<sup>th</sup>. You can register your entire family under one account, so you only need to run your credit card once. The cost to enter is \$7.00 per exhibitor, for as many entries as you like (subject to department rules).

#### We're here to help!

Whether you've entered online or are more comfortable registering in person, bring your entries to the Goicoechea Home Arts Building during check-in hours. We'll get you your exhibit tags and make sure your entries get where they're supposed to go. If you miss the online registration deadline - relax! Bring your exhibits to the Exhibit building during check-in hours, and our helpful volunteers will get you in. Please arrive before 10 am Thursday if you haven't registered online. # PLANT PRODUCTS RANCH, RANGE & TOWN

## **Department A**

Be sure and read the Home Arts Rules and General Judging Standards before entering.

#### **Department Rules:**

- Exhibitors may not enter more than one of each type of plant in each Class (i.e. one exhibit of Granny Smith apples and one exhibit of Golden Delicious apples are fine, two exhibits of Golden Delicious apples are not.)
- Prizes will be awarded or withheld at the Judge's discretion.
- Entries must be exhibited by the grower and must be grown in Nevada. Persons entering exhibits for others must state that when registering.
- Select uniform, insect free, disease free and clean specimens. Judges may taste entries for quality.
- All exhibits must contain the listed number of specimens.
- Exhibits will be judged based on quality, number of kinds of plants, educational value, attractiveness of display and ingenuity of the exhibitor.
- Each exhibitor may use a wall or table space not to exceed nine (9) square feet.
- Exhibitors may enter multiple educational exhibits but may not enter more than one exhibit per theme.
- It is acceptable for parents to assist with setup of displays entered in under-18 age groups, but it must be clear the majority of the work is the child's. If the superintendent feels this is not the case, the entry may be judged more harshly or disqualified.

- "Stock Vegetables" are produce that is intended for livestock feed and is usually of very large size. These entries are judged on size and uniformity.
- The Small Produce Display category is for decorative exhibits not intended to have an educational component. This category can include live plants.

#### **Educational Exhibits:**

- Each educational exhibit is to be built around one of the following themes:
- Crop Forages an exhibit of crops raised for livestock forage
- Garden Display exhibits of mixed vegetables, fruits and/or herbs.
- Cultivated Herbs an exhibit of herbs grown for cooking or medicinal purposes.
- Wild Plants Edible or Medicinal an exhibit featuring native wild plants that have food and/or medicinal value.
- Weeds An exhibit displaying noxious or pest weeds found in the yard, field or range.
- Range Plants for Livestock an exhibit of native plants of forage value for livestock grazing.
- Range Plants for Wildlife an exhibit of native plants of forage value for wildlife.



## Additional Rules for Forage In Sheaf:

- The exhibitor is responsible for ensuring that his/her exhibits are identified correctly and entered in the appropriate Class.
- Exhibits should be well cured (dried) and should be tied securely but not tightly at the butt, the middle and below the heads.
- Use a uniform string or ribbon no bailing twine please.
- Forage plants should be selected for quality as feed, not simply large size.
- Retain all leaves on specimens and avoid coarse stems.
- Specimens should be clean (only the variety called for present in the sheaf).
- Alfalfa and clovers should have five stems and the blossoms should not have yet gone to seed.
- Grasses and grains cut for hay should be gathered before the heads are mature (before they start to turn tan or yellow).
- Wheat, rye and oats cut for grain should have fully mature heads.
- Please be sure to identify the Class when you enter. In order to avoid duplicative exhibits, each exhibitor is limited to ONE exhibit for each type of forage.

#### **Department Awards:**

- P Dante Siri Memorial Revolving Trophy for "Best of Show in Educational Exhibits" awarded on accumulated BLUE ribbons. In the case of a tie, red ribbons will determine the winner.
- Y Kent McAdoo Memorial Revolving Trophy for "Best of Show Forage in Sheaf" awarded on accumulated BLUE ribbons won in the Forage classes for under-18 age groups. In the case of a tie, red ribbons will determine the winner.

- Each individual entry must be in a plastic bag with a twist tie (not tape or ziploc) on a paper plate.
- No mixes, canned fillings, canned frostings or other shortcuts are allowed except as noted in the decorated class.
- Anyone may enter the Professional Class. Teachers, professionals and department judges MUST enter this Class. This Class is not eligible for Special Awards.
- Exhibitors may enter as many exhibits as they want in each Class; however, duplicative entries will not be accepted (e.g. two chocolate Bundt cakes, two plates of brownies.)
- Unattractive food displays will not be accepted or shown.

Be sure and read the Home Arts Rules and General Judging Standards before entering.

#### **DEPARTMENT RULES:**

- All entries must be properly labeled for identification.
- Articles entered should not have the name of the exhibitor visible. Exhibitor's name may be covered with masking tape.
- Every article which is to be hung must be mounted and ready to be hung, with wire or hanger attached.
- Ensure your exhibit is clean and wellpresented to the judges.
- Open work should be displayed on stiff colored paper. Do not display on cellophane.
- Collections of small items must be mounted securely on a base no larger than 12 x 18 inches. ALL collections/sets must be joined together by means of hangers, wire, string, etc. and ready for display BEFORE arriving at the Fair. Multiplepiece sets that are not connected will not be accepted unless each item is entered in separate categories.
- Exhibitors may enter multiple items per Class; however, duplicative items in the judgement of the department superintendent will not be accepted.
- Anyone may enter the Open Class. Teachers, professionals and department judges MUST enter this Class. This Class is not eligible for Special Awards.
- All items entered in knitting classes should be knitted entirely by hand. Any items knitted using a knitting loom or knitting machine should be entered in the appropriate classes in Yarn Crafts.

All items entered in Yarn Crafts classes must be made with yarn, string or thread of some kind. Other materials may be used to add interest or variety, but the yarn, string or thread must be proportionally greater than other materials used. Felted items must be made from yarn, NOT from the fiber itself and NOT from fabric.



#### **DEPARTMENT AWARDS:**

- Y Item Made from Fiber Spun by Exhibitor: Items will be entered in the Class in which they belong and will be designated by a special tag at the Fair. From these tagged items the winning entry will be selected by the judges.
- Original Design: To be eligible for this award, the item must be created solely by the exhibitor and never before published in *any* form. This includes internet blogging, posting, sharing, etc. Pattern must be created by exhibitor.
- Beaded Knit or Crochet: To be eligible for this award, the entry must use beads knitted or crocheted into the work, not stitched on after knitting/crocheting. ## FLOWER SHOW Department F

Be sure and read the Home Arts Rules and General Judging Standards before entering! All flowers will be received in the Flower Building from 8:00 am-5:00 pm, Thursday. There will be no Wednesday acceptance hours for Flowers exhibits. Exhibitors may pick up entry tags Wednesday night and bring their exhibits Thursday.

#### **Department Rules:**

- Exhibitors may enter multiple exhibits in each Class; however, duplicative entries will not be accepted (two small container gardens, two arrangements on the same theme, two of the same cultivar).
- Exhibits must contain the exact number of specimens noted in the Premium List. Any other quantities may disqualify an exhibit.
- The Committee shall have the right to remove any exhibit which has become unsightly. Exhibits with insects or disease will not be allowed in the competition and will be immediately removed from the premises.
- Entrants must use clear glass containers for their exhibits, marked underneath with the name of exhibitor and Class number. Use a container that is proportionally sized to the flowers it contains (i.e. small flowers in small container, etc.). The Elko County Fair will not be responsible for loss or breakage.
- Exhibits entered in the wrong Class or Category may be disqualified. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to read the premium list and follow the instructions.
- Foliage must be attached to all flowers except sweet peas, tuberous begonias and bells of Ireland. Please remove foliage below the water line.

- Exhibits calling for more than one stem should have stems cut the same length.
- Greenhouse plants must have been grown by the exhibitor or must have been in his or her possession for a minimum of four months.
- Foliage must be clean, but not polished with oil or any plant preparation.

# Additional rules for Garden Club Sponsored Displays:

- Garden Club Sponsored Displays are open to ALL exhibitors, not just members of the Elko Garden Club.
- Exhibitors are permitted one entry per theme.

#### Additional rules for Artistic Arrangements:

- Exhibitors are permitted one entry per theme.
- Fresh and dried plant material is to be used in all arrangements. No artificial flowers, foliage or fruits may be used. A minimum of painted or treated plant material is allowed.
- Flowers and plant material may be selfgrown or purchased by the arranger in Elko County.

Be sure and read the Home Arts Rules and General Judging Standards before entering!

#### **Department Rules:**

- Entries must be the exhibitor's own work, taken in the last 2 years and not previously entered in the Fair.
- Entries taken with a mobile device (tablet or phone), digital cameras, film cameras or drones are accepted.
- Exhibitors are limited to one entry per class (one color landscape, one black & white portrait, etc). Exhibitors are limited to 20 entries total.
- Open Class is an entry category for teachers, published photographers, and those who sell their work as a business. Anyone can enter this category who wishes to have their work judged against professionals.
- Photographs must be printed and mounted securely on a backing board, foam core or single or double-weight mat board. Ensure your work is mounted cleanly and securely without rough edges.
- All entries must be clearly marked on the back with exhibitor's name, phone number, division (age group) and class/description (J-XXX/Color portrait).
- Size of photographs must be between 5"x7" and 8"x12". Panoramic photographs must be between 8"x16" and 8"x24".
- Photographs must have been taken by the exhibitor within the last two years. Mounting may have been done by someone else.
- Claim checks must accompany each entry as it is picked up. Please have your items checked out by the Department

representatives before leaving the premises. Non-compliance with this rule will disqualify the entrant from entering any of their work in this department for a minimum of one year. No exceptions.

- Photographs may be disqualified for the following:
  - Prints are matted with a border or in a frame, are in an odd shape (ovals, triangles) or include any sort of border image inserted by software or editing apps.
  - Prints are falling off the backing board or edges of board are roughly cut/trimmed.
  - Photographs bearing any words or date stamps.
  - Images printed anything other than paper are prohibited. Please enter these types of items in the Fine Arts or Hobbies & Crafts departments.

## Judging Standards:

25 points - Overall Impact – photograph's subject matter and style stands out among all other entries and is engaging to the viewer. 25 points - Originality & Creativity – photographer's approach to the subject matter shows thought, is interesting, and utilizes unique points of view to tell a story within the boundaries of the camera's frame, engaging the audience.

25 points - Technical Quality – photograph's primary subject is in focus, has appropriate lighting, follows basic rules of composition, and is free of distracting objects.

25 points - Matting & Display – photograph is securely attached to a board without gaps or bubbles with no more than  $\frac{1}{4}$  -inch of the print over of the board, and mat board has clean, smooth edges.

## **Class Descriptions:**

Black & White – The photograph was taken on black & white film or has been transformed to a pure black & white image using software or an app

**Color** – The photograph has been taken with color film, digital camera, or device (phone, tablet, or drone)

**Digitally manipulated/enhanced** – The original photograph has been heavily edited or processed to create a new image, not limited to having other images copied and pasted within the picture by software or darkroom methods.

Sepia –The photograph has been transformed into a reddish-brown or yellowish-brown monochrome tint, creating an antique/vintage look to the image

Specialty paper – The image entered must be printed on a material such as metallic, gold, silver gelatin or any type other than standard glossy, matte, pearl, or luster papers. Note: Minimal digital photo manipulation/alteration is accepted for all entries. This includes burning, dodging, exposure, contrast and color adjustments, cropping, stitching (for panorama only) and HDR processing.

- Follow premium list closely to enter in the proper class.
- Exhibitors may enter more than one exhibit in each Class; however duplicative entries will not be accepted (e.g. two women's blouses, two 2-pc baby outfits.)
- Exhibitors showing clothing items must supply an appropriate clothes hanger.
- Entries in the Recycled/Repurposed Class must include a photograph of the article before alteration.
- Anyone may enter the Open Class. Teachers, professionals and department judges MUST enter this Class. This Class is not eligible for Special Awards
- Exhibits will be disqualified if in the judges' opinions:
  - The article is soiled
  - The article was not sewn by the exhibitor
  - Items exhibited as hand sewn are not 100% hand sewn (seam finishes not included).
